Based solely on top quality McLaren Vale fruit, from vines with an average age of 50 years, the Willunga 100 wines aim to inject quality and excitement back into Australian wine at this price. They are individual wines that reflect the character of the area in which they were grown and the varieties from which they were made.

Winemaking is by Steve Pannell, a dynamic winemaker who ensures that the Willunga 100 wines are standout examples of the region.
